My goal is to do as much as possible so that whomever takes the mantle for FD 2023 has less work. I hope my suggestions will help everyone involved gets to enjoy the activity that I love.

# Separate N1MM Master Computer

I will set up a separate computer wired directly to the router with its own battery backup that will be master for logging.

**12V Power Source for Router** A 12V battery-backed power source for the router will keep it online during any outages.

**Rig Configurations** Have a single configuration for all of the rigs hat work on: SSB, CW, and FT8. People intending to operate bring their own

equipment -- that will not be provided.

# **Reference Cards**

Pictorial reference cards/sheet(s) should be built to address the commonly used functions (ie. Mic gain, output power, mode) and at every operating station. There will be one on basic usage of N1MM on how to change operators, log a contact, and how to launch FT8.

Antennas

Obtain a DX Commander POTA/ SOTA vertical along with the two wire antennas that were available this year. We need to look into the coax situation as well to ensure we have long, medium, and short runs.

# **Power Redundancy**

Something like a West Mountain Radio ISOpwr+ connects a load, a battery, and a power source and will automatically switch between battery and power source as needed while keeping the battery charged.

## Laptop OS

There should be a single OS image that is fresh for all laptops so that they are as de-cluttered and lean as possible.

Location, Location, Location Secure the location for FD 2023 so we can scout ahead and figure out what we need with ample time to get everything ready. Conclusion

There were several lessons learned this year and we can make FD 2023 better by planning sooner.

# 'Dead' bands

By John Shannon, K3WWP There are two reasons a band sounds 'dead':

1. Conditions in the ionosphere, i.e. propagation does not permit communication at the time.

2. Everyone is listening on a band, but no one is transmitting. Number 2 is much more likely to be the reason.

Even if #1 is true, there are still other means of getting your signal from here to there. There is ground-wave coverage allowing communication between stations in a certain geographical area, the size of which depends on frequency, local terrain, and other factors.

The bottom line tip is: If you tune across a band and don't hear anything, try calling CQ for a few minutes or more. You may be surprised what will happen. There are often answers to CQs on 'dead' bands and then some good solid rag chews exotic DX.

# **QRP:** low and easy

Of the many challenges in Ham radio, from propagation, feed lines, time of day and bands, one challenge stands out from the others as a reward: operating at low power levels, "QRP." Some Hams believe more is better and they hammer the full, legal 1,500 watts; little do they realize that 5 watts is just a few dB down and can be heard pretty darn well.

Operating QRP marks an operator as an artist and making a QRP contact feels like landing a record trout with a light fly rod. QRP gear tends to be small and compact so you can easily go outside and enjoy a pretty day while romancing the airwaves. The Rolls Royce of QRO gear is the Elecraft KX2, an extremely sophisticated radio that's about the size of a small paperback book. Build a "Tuna Tin," (QRP.ME) and get a *very* small (it's a tunafish can! Really!) radio that you built yourself.

Take your very small radio with its small power and enter a contest or QSO party. Not a lot of folks will enter in the QRP category and you'll have a much better chance of placing near the top of the pack than in a worldwide contest. YOU will be the rare DX during the contest.
