World War II ended and the airwaves reopened to amateur radio. Winona Hams Walter Haeussinger, Ross Brown, Arnold Martinson, Robert Kauphusman and Martin Peterson, along with Daniel Schmidt, Richard George, Robert Stanek, Robert Hill, Arthur Kantor, Brother Raymond, Francis Kramer and Carl Jacobson organized in October of 1946 then affiliated with the ARRL in January of 1947. At the time the club organized four members were "on the air," Haeussinger, Peterson, Kramer and Brother Raymond. "It is expected that several others will get their licenses soon,"

The little club did many interesting things and even innovated having women, not only as members, but as club officers. The secretary of the Winona Amateur Radio Club in 1986, Lucille ("Lucy") Lackore, was named Minnesota Ham of the Year for her traffic work. Lackore's equipment included a two-way Kenwood 930 transceiver. She could make

contact all over the globe although the farthest she reached is Germany.

Annually members of the Winona club have conducted Field Day in June. Operating as a 1A station, the Winona Amateur Radio Club was third in the nation during 1962's Field Day. The club tallied 706 different stations including one in the Panama Canal Zone.

Individual members did fine things too. Winona Senior High School graduate James Jefferson earned a \$10,000 scholarship from the Institute of Electrical and Electronic

Engineers. "I've been interested in electronics and computers for as long as I can remember," he said. Hams Dick Lindner and George Boller even traveled to Easter Island to conduct a DXpedition.

Club members stayed on the cutting edge of technology. Club member Leslie Hittner, 175 McConnon Dr., had the only teletype installation in the city. It was designated an official bulletin station by the national amateur teletype network.



Waumandee Time Trials moved to a new location that required staffing only seven positions with six volunteers. With one volunteer calling in sick Luke Rickert, 17, KEØMDW, covered one of the race corners while Iliana and dad Kevin covered the end zone activity. Iliana communicated with the race director and let each driver know if they completed the course successfully or received a penalty for hitting a hay bale or cone. Also, she had to notify a couple drivers they were "black flagged"/done racing) for a serious driving error.

The fastest time up the hill this year was the 1:07.09 set by Jason Ross, expertly piloting his 2016 Ginetta G57 LMP3 race car. This modern car was a great crowd pleaser.



10M wide open!

10 meters has been open to Europe daily in the mornings for the last few weeks. It is open in the evenings world wide - to Asia many nights, to South America and now to Europe.

I called a station in Great Britain last Saturday. When I signed, I moved up 5 Khz to take a call from another station. 90 minutes later, I had worked 70 stations, all but two were outside the USA (Europe, Middle East, Africa).

It is an easy band to get on the air. A simple dipole at 1/2 wavelength (16.5 ft off the ground) will open the world to you.

I had such a dipole years ago strung off the top of a gutter spout on the back of my home with the other end tied to a tree. The length of the dipole is short (468/28.350 = 16.5 feet so each side is 8.25 feet). You can build one with a center conductor made of wood, plastic, PVC, plexiglass, etc. and fed with 50 ohm coaxial cable. A balun would be better to use but not mandatory.

If you can put the center higher up, do so. You gain one extra lobe of energy if you put it at one wavelength (33 ft). If you can toss a rope up higher into a tree and raise the center up 2 wavelengths, you now have a powerful antenna to work globally.

The next few years will see a lot of 10 meter activity. The weekend of December 9-11 is the ARRL 10 m contest where the band will be full of signals from 28300-29700.

Public Service: Dan Goltz, WKØW. Two major public service events were recently completed. Ride the Ridges on Sept.17, and the Waumandee Time Trials on Sept. 24. Participation was excellent, 23 hams participated in RTR, and 10 for Waumandee. Amateur involvement received rave reviews from each of the sponsoring organizations. These events sharpen our skills as well as letting use use technology like APRS, remote repeaters, cross-banding, portable setup etc.

Dan Goltz, WKØW, and Walt Kelly, KEØXI, participated in a county Emergency Management meeting. The Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehension Duty Officer was the keynote speaker. He discussed his role in support of emergency operations as a source of making resources available to emergency response officials. ARES/RACES was specifically mentioned as one of those resources. We are fortunate that our county emergency officials are aware of our capabilities, have utilized us in the past, and are willing to contact us when the need arises.

We met with Emergency Management Director Ben Klinger to discuss equipping a newly ordered communications trailer with amateur equipment. Delivery is expected around February 2023.

Dan Goltz, WKØW, and Nancy Goltz, NØNAN, presented a program about amateur radio public service involvement to the Rivertown Lions Club. The Rivertown Lions in turn donated \$50 to WARC.

A recent failure of the 835 Fusion repeater demonstrated how rapidly we can respond to communication failures. The Rooster Ridge repeater locked into transmit mode about 1:30 in the morning, and Mike WØIH was able to switch out repeaters and have things back on line by 10:30 AM the same morning resulting in only a minor disruption of service.

Trustee: Mike Foerster, WØIH. Repeaters:

The Rooster Ridge Repeater locked in the transmit mode at about 2 a.m. prior to the Waumandee weekend where we would be using the 146.835 while shutting down the 146.64 repeater! The DR-2X appears to have this as a fairly common problem. Solution is to cycle power to the repeater. For the short term, the Rooster Ridge repeater was swapped with the one from Witoka. It's a concern that the Rooster Ridge repeater is harder to get. A more permanent solution consists of building a watchdog timer in the form of an Arduino, an SWR sensor and a set of relays (NC contacts) to cycle AC & DC power to the repeater, if it should transmit for a long period of time.

A set of adapter connectors were ordered for the KAGE tower so that if the "classic" 146.64 repeater should fail, the 444.250 repeater could be reconfigures to the 146.64 frequency and connect the duplexers up to the DR-2X repeater. Connectors were \$11.80.

Tyler Scott, KFØCQX, will do our tower work, replacing the two antennas at Witoka, in the spring for \$450. This includes the required liability insurance.

HF Remote: The PC driving the ICOM IC-7300 HF Remote was shut down by Microsoft. This happens if lit is not updated about once a week. The EFHW for 160m at Witoka is not yet connected.

Emergency Preparedness: Clare Jarvis, KØNY.

The suggestion is to stage an emergency preparedness event for club members where many modes of communication are counted from repeaters to HF.

Fox Hunt: Clare Jarvis, KØNY. would like to stage another fox hunt; he would meet with persons who have not done it before and tutor them before the event. To prime members he will bring his fox hunt gear to the club's Oct. 20 meeting.

Next Meeting: KØNY will bring fox hunt gear; WK0W and AC9TO will summarize their recent public service events. Meeting will again be hybrid, at the Winona County Office as well as on Zoom. Call for nominations to the board.

A DR-2X repeater configuration was updated as a document on <u>WØNE.org</u> which specifies configurations for all three of the DR-2X repeaters.

The Witoka HF ICOM IC-7300 is running well. The EFHW antenna will be reinstalled to give 160m coverage.

Mike Cizek, WØVTT, will help evaluate the antennas at Witoka. Testing indicates a need to update the antennas. which may be expensive. Scott Tyler, KFØCQX, was asked for a quote for antenna work. He does not have insurance so the club would have to cover that. Apparently the county's request for bids is still not complete.

The FCC license for the W0NE repeaters is due 3/18/2023.
